**TEETH CLEANING & ANESTHESIA CONSENT FORM**

Like you, our greatest concern is the well being of your pet. Your pet will be anesthetized today and because we know your pet is a valuable member of your family, we want the procedure to go as safely as possible. We use the latest in anesthetic and monitoring techniques, however, no procedure can be completely guaranteed.

We **highly recommend** a preanesthetic blood profile to help us place your pet in a low risk category. We recommend different blood screens depending on the age of your pet.

For complete care of your animal while under anesthesia we monitor blood pressure. If your pet's mean arterial pressure falls below 60, we will have to place an IV catheter and administer fluids to raise their blood pressure.

Please tell us if your pet has had ticks in the last 12 months – an additional test may be recommended.

Teeth cleanings require that antibiotics go home with the animal for several days. The usual cost for antibiotics is \$20-\$40 depending on the weight of the animal. Depending on the severity of periodontal disease in your pet's mouth several additional procedures may be required.

If any teeth are loose and roots are infected, we recommend extracting them. If deep pockets are present in the gums surrounding the teeth, we will place an **antibiotic gel** in the pockets. If a tooth looks questionable as to whether or not it has an infected root or needs extracting, then dental x-rays may be needed.

Please let us know if you want the above procedures performed on your pet should they become necessary:

Minor extractions (cost \$4-\$10 per tooth)	Yes	Call first
Dental x-rays (cost \$25-\$40)	Yes	Call First
Major extractions (cost \$65-\$85 per tooth)	Yes	Call First

While your pet is sedated it is also an excellent time for us to perform other needed services. Is there anything we can check for you? \_\_\_\_\_

There are several products you can use at home to help deter the progression of dental disease. Mouth rinse, a water additive, or an Oravet Barrier Home Kit may help keep your animal's mouth clean and healthy. Please ask a veterinary assistant about these items.
